You gave nine days of your life to stay here in Huntsville Texas while a very terrible disease was slowly making its way across the ocean that would eventually kill over 1 million people worldwide. You came to show and give your love to men who our society said were not worth it!

We have endured much. And we are still here. And if we live long enough, we will endure much more. It is the nature of life. We live, we learn, we grow. And we learn that we are the ones to learn from what the universe gives and takes.

I write this to say to you all that you take not one day of your life for granted. Learn to appreciate every moment of every day, because they are all gifts. The day that you take for granted is a day that could have been spent making someone else's life better just by the brightness of your presence.

The holiday season is upon us and it is one that is fraught with fear and longings for those who are no longer with us. We must remind ourselves that love is not dead. It is the wish of those whose loss we feel that we move on in their names and create a better world for our children and grandchildren. And that is what we must do.

Let us create that better world now – not tomorrow! Get up and do what must be done to make your tomorrow brighter. And your today! Let us bring in the new year pledged to give more and

do more for the survival of love! Each of us has a stake in it. We are all reflections of one another.
